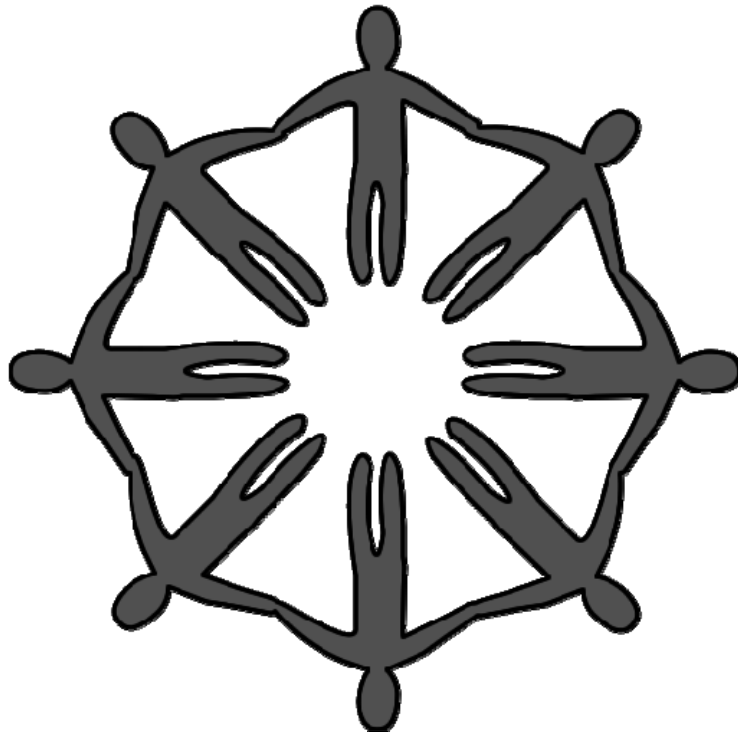

About Us

Leadership Santa Fe, founded in 1983 in Santa Fe, New Mexico, gives civic-minded people a vehicle for their community-oriented energies and trains them in specific leadership skills. We recognize that in "The City Different", leadership comes in many forms and from every sector of the community. Leadership Santa Fe is a year-long program where a diverse group of community members is introduced to a broad spectrum of organizations, governmental leaders, and issues facing Santa Fe. Our participants use this 'living classroom' to challenge and develop their own leadership capacities as well as their own interest in working for Santa Fe's common good.

The Program

The purpose of Leadership Santa Fe (LSF) is to give you a vehicle for your community-oriented energies. LSF connects you to a broad range of leaders and issues in the community and gives you a greater sense of how the community operates. Our program faculty spends time each session focusing on specific leadership skills, while guest speakers give you immediate access to Santa Fe's current leaders. Through self-reflection, group discussion, and self-defined community projects, you will have an opportunity to grow in your own capacity for leadership. Our focus is to prepare you to serve the organizations that are the civic and economic life-blood of Santa Fe .

By the time you graduate, you will be able to:

- Build strong, lasting connections with other people, organizations, and institutions in the community
- Describe how the community currently operates and define a vision for how the community should operate in the future
- Identify and address key needs of the community
- Use leadership tools and skills to help shape the future of the community
- Inspire people to work together across interests for the common good
- Identify organizations and institutions where you can successfully focus your community-oriented commitments
- Take personal responsibility to remain self-aware, centered in values, courageous in convictions, and committed to action.

The Commitment

LSF holds its Program Days on the third Thursday of each month, excepting June, July & August. It launches with a weekend opening retreat on a Friday and Saturday towards the beginning of the Program Year. Participants are expected to attend each session. Ability to attend fully is a condition of acceptance into the Program (10 days in total).

Each Program Day addresses a different topic of interest which relates to Santa Fe and current affairs.

Participants will be allocated to a Program Day of their choice and will meet on their own time in order to develop the agenda for that particular day, this usually includes enlisting speakers and a panel for the day, locating sponsorship for lunch, finding a venue appropriate to the day's topic, liaising with the Leadership Team regarding leadership skills and development, and being responsible for hosting the day.

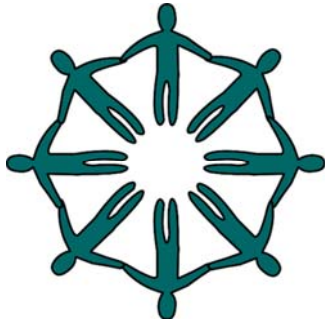

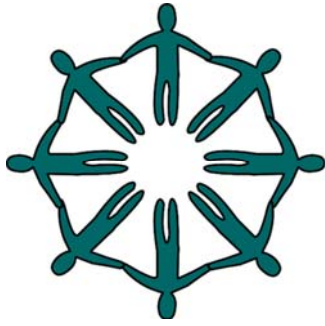

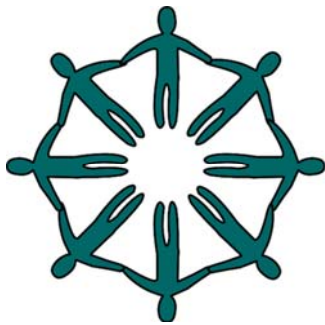

Craig DeForest

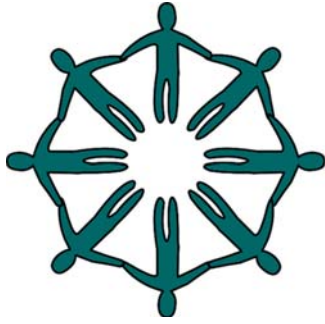

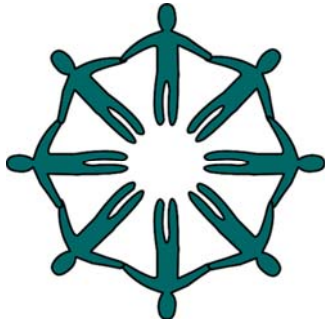
Rosemary Romero

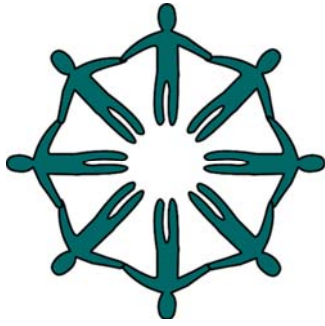

Apply to Leadership Santa Fe

Candidates for Leadership Santa Fe may self-nominate or be nominated by their employer, community organization, or another individual.

The tuition for the 2008 program was \$500.00. Scholarships are available to individuals who might otherwise be unable to participate. Fees for 2009 are yet to be decided.

The application process is as follows:

1. Go online to www.leadershipsantafe.org, click 'Apply'
2. Follow the instructions for filling in the online application form
3. OR request a hard copy of the application form and mail it to Leadership Santa Fe, P.O. Box 9444 Santa Fe, NM 87504
4. Wait for Board confirmation and acceptance of your place in the program
